Truth & Reconciliation Commission Comes to Halifax

Did you know that several members of the congregation and the wider Presbyterian Community took in the hearings held at the WTCC October 26-29? The truth is hard to hear and especially to know that members of our denomination were a part of the horror that aboriginal children experienced at residential schools. There were stories by the survivors and their families of kidnapping and reckless removal of the children from their parents, beatings, humiliation, loneliness, deprivation, and even murder. There were also stories of the consequences of time spent in the schools-rejection and alienation from families and community, loss of culture, alcoholism, drug dependency, and lack of parenting skills.

There were heartfelt offers of apology from the churches, several educational institutions, and individuals. There were celebrations of lives recovered, battles fought and won, birthdays missed, and aboriginal culture which is so vibrant and engaging.

The path of reconciliation is an ongoing walk with our aboriginal brothers and sisters. Healing is in sight for some, but for many it will still take a long time and may never come. We must continue the dialogue, keep the doors of sharing open, and celebrate the culture that is also part of our heritage. We were privileged to have Stephen Allen and Stewart Folster with us at the 11 a.m. service on October 30. They are passionate about trying to help right this wrong. Watch for updates from the Justice Ministry and Saskatoon Native Circle Ministry. Our Mission and Outreach Committee is planning a fundraiser for the latter next spring, before the next set of hearings take place in Saskatoon.

Eight attendees from Saint David's and Calvin gathered at Saint David's on the Sunday evening after the hearings ended to talk about the National Event, what they learned, what it meant to them, and how they would like to see the dialogue continue. We plan to meet again in January to work out some more concrete suggestions.

Already Carolyn MacDonald has made a contact with a visit to Indian Brook for a talk with Isabel Knockwood, a residential school survivor and author. Take the time to talk with Carolyn and hear about what she learned.

Peace and Quiet

One of my favourite things about Saint David's is the peace and tranquility of the early Sunday service at 9 AM. There is special meaning in coming together for quiet meditation and reflection in our beautiful sanctuary, before the other activities of the Lord's Day. It gives calmness and a sense of peace to the heart.

The modern world cannot stand quiet. It seems that every waking moment must be filled with some type of animated conversation, music blaring, or noisy activity. Even the current obsession with text messaging and other technological activities, while quiet in themselves, indicates an unwillingness to ever be alone with one's thoughts. A department store manager told me that in his managerial training they were given the reason for loud music in their stores: they did not want customers to think, only react! We see it especially now, with all the noise associated with Christmas.

Seven years ago, when I was teaching the little girls' class, we did an experiment. How long could teacher and pupils sit quietly, without making sounds, without giggles, and not much movement? Have you ever tried that with nine excited girls, ages seven and eight?

The lesson was about Elijah's pity party in 1 Kings 19, after he heard that Queen Jezebel was after him. There he was, feeling sorry for himself because he felt alone and fearful of the queen's wrath. How did God get his attention? Not by a mighty wind, not by the earthquake, not even by fire. God was not in these. It was by a still small voice (verse 12). My marginal reading says it could be translated as "a sound of gentle stillness." Read the story, first of Elijah's victory over the false prophets (1 Kings 18: 17-46) and then 1 Kings 19:1-18.

God's voice of gentle stillness is the same in 2011. Sometimes we just need to get away from the noise and activity and listen. Why not join us on Sunday mornings at the early service!

Oh, about the experiment! We sat quietly without giggling, whispering, or moving around for about six minutes. Finally one of us broke the stillness. Can you guess who?

CANADA YOUTH 2012 - 'On Fire'

The CANADA YOUTH 2012 conference will be held on July 3 - 8, 2012 at Brock University in St. Catharines, Ontario. Canada Youth 2012 is an initiative of the national Presbyterian Church in Canada, which started in the year 2000, and meets every three years.

Youth and youth leaders come from across Canada to meet in a time of fellowship, spiritual growth, worship, music, and of participation in many varied, interesting, and fun activities, crafts, games and exercise. Youth line up early for the daily two hour worship services and leave the Conference with a sense of excitement. There are several "tracks" - a Conference Track for ages Grade 9 (completed) - Grade 12; a Mission Track for ages 18 - 25; Adult Advisors positions (ages 25 plus). The Canada Youth 2012 site will be up on November 30th. To view information about previous years, Google Canada Youth 2009. Costs for Canada Youth 2009 were approximately \$700/900. This included the Conference and transportation.

What a Difference a Year Can Make!

your places of employment, getting together for lunch and coffee, and any other excuse I can come up with to connect with you. I didn't make my own personal goal of visiting everyone in my first year but that has a lot to do with your schedules and also that there are many more people connected to the congregation than I first imagined, but I came very close!

What a difference a year can make... and what a difference I/we can expect in the months ahead. I thank you for your support and cooperation over the past year, but more than this, I thank you for your love displayed in so many ways. A year ago many of you were strangers to me and now you feel like part of my family. There can be no denying the challenges that await us in the next year but with the guidance of God and the promises of Christ we can be confident in our direction and our future.
