

MORE ABOUT THE REFUGEE CLINIC

The Halifax Refugee Clinic is the focus of our Mission and Outreach luncheon today. The Clinic is located on Grafton Street near Saint David's. It provides legal and settlement services to people who are claiming refugee status in Nova Scotia who can't afford to hire a lawyer. The Clinic is a registered charity and is registered with the province as a non-profit association.

In May, the Clinic received an award named in honor of a distinguished member of the congregation at Saint David's. The Legal Information Society's *Honourable Lorne Clarke, Q.C. Access to Justice Award* was given to the Clinic for its "outstanding work in promoting access to justice for refugees". The award recognizes

the dedication of a small staff and committed group of volunteers whose work has resulted in an 83% success rate compared to the national average of 47%. The Clinic also helps refugees deal with work permits, housing, budgeting, English language skills and access to health care and psychological support.

The law is a powerful and often frightening instrument even for people born in Canada," says Maria Franks, LISNS Executive Director, "For refugee claimants fleeing strife and often in fear for their and their family's lives, the law and the legal system is even more frightening and alien. The Refugee Clinic is a shining example of an organization working to improve access to justice for this vulnerable population and embodies the spirit behind the LISNS Access to Justice Award."

Malawi Our gifts to *Presbyterians Sharing* help people in Canada connect with long-term mission partners around the world through short-term mission visits. Karen Lye travelled to Malawi with St. Andrew's Coldwater in 2010. In the village of Sakata, a woman whose son is disabled sought Karen out. The woman had heard that Karen works with people who have disabilities and wanted to spend time with her. Speaking different languages, they spent a lot of time just sitting together. Karen writes, "In these moments of silence, I truly felt what it meant to be "present", and a feeling of peace washed over me like I had never experienced before. The song rang in my ears, "Be still for the presence of the Lord is moving in this place." Let us pray for the people whose lives these mission trips continue to transform.
