Early Morning Service in the Season of Advent



**Introduction to Theme:** Over the four Sundays of Advent this year we have focussed on the following four themes:

- Seeing beyond the horizon of humanity (Luke 21:25-36)
- John the Baptist: prepare the way of the Lord (Luke 3:1-6)
- Responding to prophetic voices (Luke 3:7-18)
- The child of promise (Luke 1:39-45)

### Gathering:

God comes! So don't let go of all the reasons to rejoice. We will sing a song of Advent to the One who fills our lives with joy. God comes! So don't stop lifting your prayers with thanksgiving. We will sing a song of Advent, to the One who hears our words and silence.

God comes! So don't stop giving your hearts to God. We will sing a song of Advent to the One who graces us with a joy we cannot begin to understand.

**Zephaniah 3:14-20** Sing aloud, O daughter Zion; shout, O Israel! Rejoice and exult with all your heart, O daughter Jerusalem! The LORD has taken away the judgments against you, he has turned away your enemies. The king of Israel, the LORD, is in your midst; you shall fear disaster no more. On that day it shall be said to Jerusalem: Do not fear, O Zion; do not let your hands grow weak. The LORD, your God, is in your midst, a warrior who gives victory; he will rejoice over you with gladness, he will renew you in his love; he will exult over you with loud singing as on a day of festival.

Prayer of Confession: With joy draw waters from the well of salvation! Forgiveness is real! Trust it and share it; forgive as you have been forgiven. Jesus said: "There is joy in heaven over one sinner who repents." Truly, God is our salvation we shall trust and not be afraid! The peace of our Saviour Jesus Christ be with you all. And also with you (we continue in prayer)

**Luke 3:7-18** John said to the crowds that came out to be baptized by him, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? Bear fruits worthy of repentance. Do not begin to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our ancestor'; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. Even now the ax is lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire." And the crowds asked him, "What then should we do?" In reply he said to them, "Whoever has two coats

must share with anyone who has none; and whoever has food must do likewise." Even tax collectors came to be baptized, and they asked him, "Teacher, what should we do?" He said to them, "Collect no more than the amount prescribed for you." Soldiers also asked him, "And we, what should we do?" He said to them, "Do not extort money from anyone by threats or false accusation, and be satisfied with your wages." As the people were filled with expectation, and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Messiah, John answered all of them by saying, "I baptize you with water; but one who is more powerful than I is coming; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire.

**Continuing the Conversation:** "Tis the season – the season of giving. How is this Lucan passage with its call to 'bear fruit worth of repentance' a call for us to change our attitudes and lives?

(vs. 1-2)

By your word and Spirit, O God, *sanctify these your own gifts of bread and wine, that the bread which we break* may be to us communion in the body of Christ, and the *cup of blessing which we bless may* be communion in the blood of Christ Come, holy Spirit, come.
