

The acts of the early church

With the death and resurrection of Jesus, the early church formed around the apostles now filled with the power of the Holy Spirit and began a ministry which continues to this day. Prayer of Confession: Almighty God, you poured your Spirit upon gathered disciples creating bold tongues, open ears, and a new community of faith. 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Scripture: Acts 16:9-15 During the night Paul had a vision: there stood a man of Macedonia pleading with him and saying, "Come over to Macedonia and help us." When he had seen the vision, we immediately tried to cross over to Macedonia, being convinced that God had called us to proclaim the good news to them. We set sail from Troas and took a straight course to Samothrace, the following day to Neapolis, and from there to Philippi, which is a leading city of the district of Macedonia and a Roman colony. We remained in this city for some days. On the sabbath day we went outside the gate by the river, where we supposed there was a place of prayer; and we sat down and spoke to the women who had gathered there. A certain woman named Lydia, a worshiper of God, was listening to us; she was from the city of Thyatira and a dealer in purple cloth. The Lord opened her heart to listen eagerly to what was said by Paul. When she and her household were baptized, she urged us, saying, "If you have judged me to be faithful to the Lord, come and stay at my home." And she prevailed upon us.

A FEW LEADING WOMEN

We've already heard Dorcas' story. "The contribution of women was made possible, to some extent, by the expansion of the gospel within the environment of the first-century family home and workshop, arenas where women could operate without violating societal norms for proper behavior. By the examples of Lydia, Prisca and Phoebe, this study examines the possibility and nature of women's leadership in the ministry of Paul. The lives of all three of these women reflect an affirmation of divine power: Lydia is witnessed at the very moment of conversion, Prisca when encountering the Apostle in mutual work and in the creation of the "church in her house," and Phoebe further along in the complexities of a missionary career for the church at Cenchreae. Each of these early believers in the emerging church demonstrates an exercising of the *charismata*." (V.K. McCarty) "The contrast between vision and reality is great.
