
## WELCOME TO...

Focus Reading **2 Thessalonians 2:1-5, 13-17** As to the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ and our being gathered together to him, we beg you, brothers and sisters, not to be quickly shaken in mind or alarmed, either by spirit or by word or by letter, as though from us, to the effect that the day of the Lord is already here. Let no one deceive you in any way; for that day will not come unless the rebellion comes first and the lawless one is revealed, the one destined for destruction. He opposes and exalts himself above every so-called god or object of worship, so that he takes his seat in the temple of God, declaring himself to be God. Do you not remember that I told you these things when I was still with you? But we must always give thanks to God for you, brothers and sisters beloved by the Lord, because God chose you as the first fruits for salvation through sanctification by the Spirit and through belief in the truth. For this purpose he called you through our proclamation of the good news, so that you may obtain the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ. So then,

brothers and sisters, stand firm and hold fast to the traditions that you were taught by us, either by word of mouth or by our letter. Now may our Lord Jesus Christ himself and God our Father, who loved us and through grace gave us eternal comfort and good hope, comfort your hearts and strengthen them in every good work and word.

**Focus Theme:** Stand Firm and hold fast "Standing firm" is the ultimate challenge. The first-century community of believers was susceptible to teachings that moved them away from the teachings of Paul and other teachers who brought them to their young Christian faith. They could rest on the new, unsound teachings they heard or live into the traditions they knew and trusted. "Standing firm" creates these and other challenges in our contemporary society. We too run the risk of being deceived, especially when we ourselves are in vulnerable places. How do we recapture those memories of God in our midst when we are being caught up and swept away by those who would want to deceive us and erode our faith traditions? "The image of standing firm is rich," Brownlee writes, "especially when our instinct is to do battle, to take on whatever forces assault the gospel. Paul's call to stand firm is a test of our confidence both in Christ's victory and that we do and will participate in his glory. To stand firm calls us not to take things into our own hands, but to rest on our confidence that they are in Christ's pierced hands" (The Lectionary Commentary: Acts and the Epistles).
