#### Call to Worship

**Focus Reading** Luke 23:33-43 When they came to the place that is called The Skull, they crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on his right and one on his left. [[ Then Jesus said, 'Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing.']] And they cast lots to divide his clothing. And the people stood by, watching; but the leaders scoffed at him, saying, 'He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, his chosen one!' The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour

wine, and saying, 'If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!' There was also an inscription over him, 'This is the King of the Jews.' One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding him and saying, 'Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!' But the other rebuked him, saying, 'Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong.' Then he said, 'Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom.' He replied, 'Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise.'

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**Reflection from the Church of Scotland:** G B Caird ("Saint Luke") asserts, 'We have to allow for the possibility that the stories of Jesus have undergone some legendary accretion in the process of transmission, but sober criticism cannot get behind the gospel record to a plain, commonplace tale, devoid of the miraculous and supernatural.

The early Christians believed that, in Christ, God had been at work in new and astonishing ways and they had the evidence of their own eyes to support their faith. Luke cannot justly be accused of exaggerating the miraculous element of his narrative.' Luke believed that Jesus was the servant of a divine purpose, which he had found to be outlined and confirmed in the Scriptures with which he was so familiar, therefore he constantly portrays him as acting under the authority of a divine necessity. The crucifixion narrative seeks, therefore, to portray such a Jesus, and the way the story unfolds has an authenticity which is devoid of frills and unnecessary overlay. The conversation with the criminals who were crucified with him communicates something which is fundamental to Luke's portraval of Jesus – that the outcast can be rescued. The reign of the Kingdom is supreme, both now and in the future. It must be what we seek, and, ultimately, is what we are promised.
