

LIVING IN THE LIGHT

Gathering: Arise, shine; for your light has come, and the glory of the LORD has risen upon you. For darkness shall cover the earth, and thick darkness the peoples; but the LORD will arise upon you, and his glory will appear over you.

Hymn: Blest are they (1-3)

Prayer to begin worship: God of Blazing light, through the power of the cross you shattered our darkness, scattering the fears that bind us and setting us free to live as your children. Give us courage and conviction that we may joyfully turn and follow you into new adventures of faithful service, led by the light that shines through Jesus Christ our Savior. Amen.

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Hymn: Blest are they (4-5) <u>624</u>

Prayer: Lord you are with us in your Word and your Sacrament help us to recognise and appreciate your presence more. Hear us Lord. Lord you are present with us as we gather in your name. May we witness to your presence by loving and respecting each other as you have taught us. Hear us Lord. Lord your presence is seen in the many faces of your people. In their daily lives, their work and pleasure, in their joys and sorrows, in their successes and failures, in their dyings and risings, you are with them. Help us to see your many faces. Forgive us when we fail to see you in our neighbour. Hear us Lord. Lord you identified yourself with the poor, the lonely, the condemned, the neglected, the persecuted and all those less fortunate than ourselves. Open our eyes to see you in the face of the other and enable us to serve you as we serve others in your name. Hear us Lord.

Scripture: **Matthew 5:1-12** When Jesus saw the crowds, he went up the mountain; and after he sat down, his disciples came to him.

Then he began to speak, and taught them, saying:

"Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

"Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted.

"Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth.

"Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.

"Blessed are the merciful, for they will receive mercy.

"Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God.

"Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God. "Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness'

sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. "Blessed are you when people revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you."

Hymn: What does the Lord require of you <u>709</u>

Viewing the Beatitudes through the lens of the Cross, we are invited to seek and find the action of God in the most unexpected people: the poor, the mourners, the persecuted, the peacemakers. Their lives now, in the present, hold the blessing and transforming power of God, as they live and struggle for justice, peace, and wholeness in their world. All of the readings today lead us on a labyrinthian journey toward a vision with God not only at its center, but God at every turn, upsetting our expectations and challenging us to take another step deeper into the mystery of divine presence dwelling in our world. God is calling us to follow Christ, the Beloved, into the world to engage in a lifetime of faithful, creative, courageous, community-building love. (Susan Blain)

Discussion Questions

- 1. What are some of the challenges the Beatitudes bring up in your life?
- 2. What are some of the blocks in your life that keep you from fully experiencing the blessedness of the Beatitudes?

Invitation: Come, you welcomed and blessed come, all who hunger and thirst.

Through Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit in your holy Church, all honour and glory is yours, almighty God, now and forever more. (Our Father...)

Closing Reflection The Beatitudes invite us to be open to the presence of God within us. Then our Christian attitudes of social justice, peace, and mercy can flow over into daily acts of compassionate love and service.
