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Opening Prayer

Creator God, forgive our moments of ingratitude, the spiritual blindness that prevents us from appreciating the wonder that is this world, the endless cycle of nature, of life and death and rebirth. Forgive us for taking without giving, reaping without sowing. Open our eyes to see, our lips to praise, our hands to share. May our feet tread lightly on the path we tread, and our footsteps be worthy of following, for they lead to you.

Searching the Scriptures **1 Samuel 3:1-10** Now the boy Samuel was ministering to the LORD under Eli. The word of the LORD was rare in those days; visions were not widespread. At that time Eli, whose eyesight had begun to grow dim so that he could not see, was lying down in his room; the lamp of God had not yet gone out, and Samuel was lying down in the temple of the LORD, where the ark of God was. Then the LORD called, "Samuel! Samuel!" and he said, "Here I am!" and ran to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." But he said, "I did not call; lie down again." So he went and lay down. The LORD called again, "Samuel!" Samuel got up and went to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." But he said, "I did not call, my son; lie down again." Now Samuel did not yet know the LORD, and the word of the LORD had not yet been revealed to him. The LORD called Samuel again, a third time. And he got up and went to Eli, and

said, "Here I am, for you called me." Then Eli perceived that the LORD was calling the boy. Therefore Eli said to Samuel, "Go, lie down; and if he calls you, you shall say, 'Speak, LORD, for your servant is listening." So Samuel went and lay down in his place. Now the LORD came and stood there, calling as before, "Samuel! Samuel!" And Samuel said, "Speak, for your servant is listening." A different perspective: "Americans have been turning toward spirituality as a protest vote against conventional religion. In the last dozen years, American religious institutions have undergone a myriad of crises-abuse scandals, conflicts, schism, and partisan political entanglement, to name a few-resulting in a great religious recession. Poll after poll reveals that organized religions -mainline Protestant, evangelical, Roman Catholic, and Jewish -are in varying states of disarray and decline. Sadness, even doom, has gripped many congregations, as the formerly faithful disaffiliate, and those who remain struggle to pay clergy and fix leaky roofs." (D. Butler-Bass)

Question for discussion and reflection

1. Spirituality is not part of the common language of the Presbyterian Church. What does spirituality mean to you?

2. Paul encourages us to seek the gifts of the Spirit and tells us they all have a place in God's plan for the church and for the lives of individuals (1 Corinthians 12). Identify the areas of your life that are gifts of the Spirit of God.

3. We are told there are greater gifts and that all Christians are encouraged to seek them out and live them. The greatest gift of all is identified as love. The church is seeking the relationship between head (knowledge), heart (emotion) and hand (service). How does love become the gift to encourage all three?

It is both the story of who and what we each are and the greater story of which we are a part – the ongoing story of God's reign and life on earth. And so, we do in this place what Christ did in an upper room, that the story of hope – of death and rising of new life and the fruit of the kingdom – may continue on in us, and through us. *Amen*.

Invitation: This is the table of God on which is set tokens of love and hope and to which the Holy One calls all who want to share in that life. So come – whether your faith is strong or weak, whether your hope shines brightly or is dimmed. Come, ready to receive – for all are welcome at this feast of love.
