NATIONAL ABORIGINAL DAY

Call To Worship:

We come together to worship the one God and Maker of us all. Let us put aside our differences and be united in our love of the Creator. We come together to seek healing and reconciliation. Let us deal with past hurts and go forward together in the comfort and strength of our Holy Spirit. We come together to honour and affirm our faith as children of the One God who created us. Let us praise God for all mercies. Let us worship God. Hymn: For the beauty of the earth (1-3)

Confession of Brokenness: We regret that there are those whose lives have been deeply scarred by the effects of the mission and ministry of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. For our Church we ask forgiveness of God. It is our prayer that God, who is merciful, will guide us in compassionate ways towards helping them to heal.

We ask, also, for forgiveness from Aboriginal peoples. What we have heard we acknowledge. It is our hope that those whom we have wronged with a hurt too deep for telling will accept what we have to say. With God's guidance our Church will seek opportunities to walk with Aboriginal peoples to find healing and wholeness together as God's people.

From the Letters 2 Corinthians 5: From now on, therefore, we regard no one from a human point of view; even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, we know him no longer in that way. So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us. So we are ambassadors for Christ, since God is making his appeal through us; we entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

Naming the Challenge: "God not only calls the church to confession, but to a ministry of reconciliation, walking together, seeking to restore justice in relationships where it is lacking. Our church is called to commit itself to support processes for healing of the wounds inflicted on aboriginal people."

We confess how difficult it is for us to change our attitudes towards others. Twenty one long years have passed since our confession before you and still our hearts are restless: (pause)

- We confess how hard it is to remember the words of confession we spoke before you and to our Aboriginal sisters and brothers. (pause)
- We confess how hard it is to remain focussed on the ministry of reconciliation when it requires such change in us and such challenge for us. (pause)
- We confess how hard it is to live out daily the promise we made to walk together, to restore justice in relationships and find common communion before the Creator of all.

Be Assured: in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us. So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!
