HOW TO PRAY IN YOUR OWN WAY

For 50 years churches, theological colleges and Councils of Churches and other ecumenical bodies have celebrated the unity and community of the AEC. Ecumenical Conferences which gave birth to the AEC can be traced as far back as 1951

The work of the AEC has been recognized across the country and beyond. A number of members have been named “Ecumenist of the Year” by the Montreal-based Canadian Centre for Ecumenism. The organization was cited in the Nova Scotia legislature for its work with Coastal Communities. Annual meetings, Biennial Conferences and Head of Churches forums constituted the main work of the organization throughout the years.

Ecumenical connections are now well established and Inter-faith dialogue reflects the changing demographic of our Atlantic region. The executive of the AEC has determined that this is the proper moment to officially ‘disband’ and move on to the next thing our Lord calls us to. 
Deuteronomy 26:1-11

When you have come into the land that the LORD your God is giving you as an inheritance to possess, and you possess it, and settle in it, you shall take some of the first of all the fruit of the ground, which you harvest from the land that the LORD your God is giving you, and you shall put it in a basket and go to the place that the LORD your God will choose as a dwelling for his name. You shall go to the priest who is in office at that time, and say to him, "Today I declare to the LORD your God that I have come into the land that the LORD swore to our ancestors to give us." When the priest takes the basket from your hand and sets it down before the altar of the LORD your God, you shall make this response before the LORD your God: "A wandering Aramean was my ancestor; he went down into Egypt and lived there as an alien, few in number, and there he became a great nation, mighty and populous. When the Egyptians treated us harshly and afflicted us, by imposing hard labor on us, we cried to the LORD, the God of our ancestors; the LORD heard our voice and saw our affliction, our toil, and our oppression. The LORD brought us out of Egypt with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm, with a terrifying display of power, and with signs and wonders; and he brought us into this place and gave us this land, a land flowing with milk and honey. So now I bring the first of the fruit of the ground that you, O LORD, have given me." You shall set it down before the LORD your God and bow down before the LORD your God. Then you, together with the Levites and the aliens who reside among you, shall celebrate with all the bounty that the LORD your God has given to you and to your house.

Romans 10:8b-13

"The word is near you, on your lips and in your heart" (that is, the word of faith that we proclaim); because if you confess with your lips that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For one believes with the heart and so is justified, and one confesses with the mouth and so is saved. The scripture says, "No one who believes in him will be put to shame." For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek; the same Lord is

Lord of all and is generous to all who call on him. For, "Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved."



Luke 4:1-13

Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness, where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing at all during those days, and when they were over, he was famished. The devil said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become a loaf of bread." Jesus answered him, "It is written, 'One does not live by bread alone.'" Then the devil led him up and showed him in an instant all the kingdoms of the world. And the devil said to him, "To you I will give their glory and all this authority; for it has been given over to me, and I give it to anyone I please. If you, then, will worship me, it will all be yours." Jesus answered him, "It is written, 'Worship the Lord your God, and serve only him.'" Then the devil took him to Jerusalem, and placed him on the pinnacle of the temple, saying to him, "If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down from here, for it is written, 'He will command his angels concerning you, to protect you,' and 'On their hands they will bear you up, so that you will not dash your foot against a stone.'" Jesus answered him, "It is said, 'Do not put the Lord your God to the test.'" When the devil had finished every test, he departed from him until an opportune time.

MISSION MOMENTS: St. Paul's McClures Mills, Truro. St. Paul's is situated in an area of Truro known as McClure's Mills. The community near the site of McClure's Grist Mill began under the leadership of the Rev. W.C. Nicholson, minister of St. James. Known first as "the Mission" St. Paul's became a congregation with 42 charter members in 1951. First meeting in a store on Willow St., the congregation moved to the church building in 1954. A deaconess, Miss Evelyn Walker promoted programs for youth and women. She established a Sunday School. Although maintaining a distinct identity, St. Paul's has remained affiliated with St. James. The community around St. Paul's has changed over the years with an increasing focus on retirement housing. Each Sunday about 20 people gather for worship at 9:30am. The congregation continues to have an active Session, Board of Managers, Ladies Guild, and Bible Study. There is an Outreach Committee which leads worship once a month at the nearby Wynn Park Nursing Home. The congregation hosts monthly socials after worship and occasionally "Grand Ole Gospel" musical gatherings for the community. In 2014, with St. James, St. Paul's entered an Interim Ministry appointment with the Rev. Dr. David Sutherland. The congregation is now in a season of discernment of how God will be best served by St. Paul's in the years ahead.
