

Hymn: When we are living

Context: "To know the truth of oneness, to long for unity is painful. It is tempting to retreat to our cliques of people who are

just like us, where we can be safe and comfortable. But Gal 3:28 compels us to be together, to live as one with those who are most radically different from us, even those we believe to be most distant from God's embrace. Living that oneness in Christ is not just doing what is politically correct, nor is it practicing the nondiscrimination that the law requires; rather, it is to have a change of heart. Living that oneness means confessing that we are sometimes the barrier builders and the weapon wielders. It sometimes means allowing ourselves to get close to those who are most difficult for us to love. It sometimes means bearing the consequences of the pain of those who were relegated to the outside. It sometimes means listening and listening and waiting and waiting until trust can be restored. It means entering into the hard work of reconciliation... If we were to allow ourselves to feel Christ's own longing for unity, Christ's own aching over our separations and divisions, what difference would it make in the way we behave toward one another in the church?" Our Response

'The principle of compassion lies at the heart of all social, religious, ethical and moral traditions, calling us always to treat all others as we wish to be treated ourselves.'

The Christian Century Magazine writer E. Louise Williams writes:

The message comes through loud and clear in Luke. The family of God includes outsiders — those there because of accidents of birth like the gentile centurion and his sick servant; those there because of the circumstances of their lives like the bereft widow; even those there because of choices they have made, like the criminal on the cross next to Jesus. They all belong to the reign of God that Jesus ushers in. Compassion doesn't give up but keeps translating and retranslating the message until all can hear in their own language and know that they belong...

God gives us birth, looks on us with compassion and sees the family resemblance. God also empowers us to look with the same eyes on one another."
