Confession: Because we trust in God's faithfulness, we are free to make our confession to God and call for his compassion. Let us, therefore, confess our sins that we may be renewed in his grace. Turn your ears our way, God, and listen. Open your eyes and take a long look at us. We know that we don't deserve a hearing from you. Our appeal is to your compassion. This prayer is our last and only hope: Lord, listen to us! Lord, forgive us! Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Luke 7:11-17 Soon afterwards he went to a town called Nain, and his disciples and a large crowd went with him. As he approached the gate of the town, a man who had died was being carried out. He was his mother's only son, and she was a widow; and with her was a large crowd from the town. When the Lord saw her, he had compassion for her and said to her, "Do not weep." Then he came forward and touched the bier, and the bearers

stood still. And he said, "Young man, I say to you, rise!" The dead man sat up and began to speak, and Jesus gave him to his mother. Fear seized all of them; and they glorified God, saying, "A great prophet has risen among us!" and "God has looked favorably on his people!" This word about him spread throughout Judea and all the surrounding country.

The story of the revival of the widow's son at Nain is a confirmation of God's faithfulness, it is a confirmation of the compassionate heart of Jesus, and it is a confirmation of the Gospel call to prioritize compassion in all of our dealings. Taken just on the heels of the story of the centurion's slave, it shows that our God honors the promises, people, values of the past while at the same time pushes the boundaries in radical ways. What is important to remember above all of this is that the central operating force in both stories is Jesus' own compassion, and it is good news indeed that his compassion is for everyone, whether male or female, slave or free, Jew or Gentile, living or dead. We greet the one who comes in your name,

your true light, your true love, the bread of compassion, the wine of renewal.

As he broke bread before the brokenness of his death, as he poured out wine before his blood was poured out on the cross, as he gave his life in acts of goodness, as he invited all to the feast of new hope, so come to us, God of Jesus, in your love.

Come to us, Spirit of our Lord of love, and let the bread and wine before us bear your life to our life, nourish us with his vision of hope, and unite us in one body of peace.

Nourish us with your brokenness, Renew us with your poured out life, Empower us with your powerlessness, that we may take root in your risen life and bear fruit in your world.

You are our life; You are our hope; You are our peace; And we praise you.

Jesus you took bread and broke it,
You shared it with your friends.

As you were broken to feed us with the bread of life.
