

We greet your coming, God, with repentance: We are more or less satisfied with ourselves; but your presence exposes our sin and failure. We are self-confident; but you challenge our confidence in ourselves. We are proud of our understanding; but you show us that we do not know everything.

We greet your coming, God, with joy: We had no true idea of what you are like; but you have shown us yourself in Jesus Christ. We felt our human life could be of no importance to you; but you have shown its value by appearing among us in human form. We are aware of the gulf between us and you; but you have bridged it with love. God, we greet your coming in Jesus Christ our Lord! (2)

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A prayer for Christmas Eve: There is nothing I can give you which you have not; but there is much, very much, that while I cannot give, You can take. 

Luke 2: 1-20 Town of Bethlehem (Scripture readers: Ken McRobbie and Colin Blanchard)

In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. All went to their own towns to be



registered. Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child. While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.
