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Confessional Prayers We are incredibly stubborn, O Lord. Help us to desire you, Lord. Help us to yearn for your presence. Pour your baptismal waters over us again, cleansing us from our self-pity and arrogance. Nourish and heal us so that we may joyfully serve you.

Wash away our jealousy, greed, and all negative thoughts and behaviours that stand in the way of our truly being the people you have called us to be. Again let us receive the blessings offered in creation, in the birth and baptism of Jesus, and in the ministry of the saints of light. We ask this in Jesus' Name. Amen.

Hymn: What was your vow and vision? 1-2

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Matthew 3:13-17 Then Jesus came from Galilee to John at the Jordan, to be baptized by him. John would have prevented him, saying, "I need to be baptized by you, and do you come to me?" But Jesus answered him, "Let it be so now; for it is proper for us in this way to fulfill all righteousness." Then he consented. And when Jesus had been baptized, just as he came up from the water, suddenly the heavens were opened to him and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and alighting on him. And a voice from heaven said, "This is my Son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased."

Hymn: What was your vow and vision? 3

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How does the Word function in the text? This brief text is complex in that the Triune God is present and all three Persons are active. To answer the question of how the Word is functioning we usually seek to understand what God or Jesus or the Spirit is doing or saying. Here God is saying, "This is my Son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased." This is an announcement of the identity of Christ - a gospel function. Jesus also is speaking, as well as being acted upon, and his announcement is that his baptism will "fulfill all righteousness." This is also a gospel function. Finally, the Spirit is active in alighting on Jesus following the baptism in the form of a dove, identifying him as the Beloved Son, again a gospel function. In each case, the Word functions to announce the good news that Jesus is the Beloved Son of God who comes to fulfill all righteousness.

With whom are you identifying in the text? We know that it is always important to identify with the people whom are addressed by the Word, not with Jesus or God or the Word itself. In this case, the Word is speaking to those who witness this baptism - and by way of the scriptures to us who now hear or read this Word. We are the ones to whom God is speaking when the voice from heaven declares, "This is my Son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased."

- What have you done as a result of your new life in Christ?
- How has Jesus led you to use your talents and gifts for righteous actions?
- What has been joyful for you on this journey?

Bless all of us in our eating and drinking at this table that our eyes may be opened, and we may recognize the risen Christ in our midst, and in each other. Amen
