Scripture: Exodus 17:1-7

From the wilderness of Sin the whole congregation of the Israelites journeyed by stages, as the LORD commanded. They camped at Rephidim, but there was no water for the people to drink. The people quarreled with Moses, and said, "Give us water to drink." Moses said to them, "Why do you quarrel with me? Why do you test the LORD?" But the people thirsted there for water; and the people complained against Moses and said, "Why did you bring us out of Egypt, to kill us and our children and livestock with thirst?" So Moses cried out to the LORD, "What shall I do with this people? They are almost ready to stone me." The LORD said to Moses, "Go on ahead of the people, and take some of the elders of Israel with you; take in your hand the staff with which you struck the Nile, and go. I will be standing there in front of you on the rock at Horeb. Strike the rock, and water will come out of it, so that the people may drink." Moses did so, in the sight of the elders of Israel. He called the place Massah and Meribah, because the Israelites quarreled and tested the LORD, saying, "Is the LORD among us or not?"

"When things are going OK it is easy to "trust God". But when the crisis comes the reality of our faith is exposed. For the Children of Israel that testing was to come regularly on their journey through the wilderness and almost never did they rise to the occasion. The crisis when it arose was serious, potentially lifethreatening. They had travelled and arrived at camp but one essential ingredient was missing-water. To be without water in the desert is no joke and perhaps the sense of fear and panic precipitated their anger at Moses and implicitly also at God. All too easily the great events of their deliverance are consigned to history and an alternative reading is presented that confirms their original prejudice against Moses' leadership. The mood is turning ugly and mob rule is not far below the surface. Moses, however, takes the problem to God. He is a person under orders and recognises something has to be done- and quickly. While it is a practical issue and there is an urgent need for it to be resolved, fundamentally it is a spiritual issue, reflecting their lack of trust in God. Moses acts decisively by first bringing the matter to God in blunt terms. Then he obeys the Lord's clear directions which involve bringing the leadership on side with him. His act is to be simple yet spectacular. Moses strikes the rock and water flows out. The need is met but the underlying problem remains. If our default position is to doubt and to express that in grumbling and disunity, it is going to be a long hard road to get to the Promised Land." (Colin Sinclair)

Invitation: Come, you welcomed and blessed come, all who thirst. Jesus calls us to the table, to the meal that nourishes our bodies and refreshes us with living water. Jesus calls us, here and now. Come to this table, you who are beloved in Christ. Come, not because you must, but because you may.

About Water There are two ways to look at water. We can look at what it is or we can look at what it means. One offers us an insight into how important it is for life on earth, the other how important water is for life in faith. Science tells us: roughly 70 percent of an adult's body is made up of water. Faith tells us: when Jesus was baptised he immediately came up out of the water and saw the heavens splitting apart and the Spirit descending on him like a dove. One tells us water gives us existence, the other tells us water gives us promise. Science tells us that there is much more fresh water stored under the ground in aquifers than on the earth's surface. And faith tells us: in the wilderness waters shall break out, and stream in the desert. The parched ground shall become a pool, and the thirsty land springs of water. One tells us water is everywhere; the other tells us hope is everywhere. Science tells us: Somewhere between 70 and 75 percent of the earth's surface is covered with water. Faith tells us: Let the waters bring forth swarms of living creatures. One tells us about size, the other tells us about abundance. Science tells us: 1.4 million children die every year as a result of diseases caused by unclean water and poor sanitation. This is about 4,000 deaths a day. Faith tells us: When the poor and needy seek water, and there is none, and their tongue fails for thirst, I the LORD will hear them, I the God of Israel will not forsake them. I will open rivers in high places, and fountains in the midst of the valleys: I will make the wilderness a pool of water, and the dry land springs of water. One tells us about selfishness, the other about generosity. Science tells us: It takes about 1 gallon of water to process a quarter pound of hamburger. Faith tells us: whosoever drinks of the water that I shall give him shall never thirst; but the water that I shall give him shall be in him a well of water springing up into everlasting life. One opens up the facts, the other opens up the meaning. The fact is: Water from the tap washes us clean from germs that harm. The meaning is: Water from baptism washes us clean from our past that hurts.

Both describe God's world and the wonder it is. Both teach us how to be alive in the world. But one describes what it is, the other describes whose we are. Water: the wonder of science - Water: the wonder of faith. New Kilpatrick Parish Church
