Property Development

Your Session is making progress on property development! Following the June Congregational meeting which resulted in unanimous approval for Session to proceed to negotiate a land lease agreement with Greenwood/Lawley, several steps have been taken.

A design session was held for congregation members in the church hall, and input was gathered regarding options and important considerations for space which the church requires. An architect was engaged to work on plans and those will be the subject of a future presentation.

Legal counsel at Stewart McKelvey has prepared a proposed land lease agreement and it is now being reviewed by counsel for Greenwood Lawley prior to bringing it back to the congregation for final approval. We thank Brian Tabor and Ross Cantwell (our financial advisors) for working on our behalf. A full presentation was made to Presbytery in November, and they offer blessings on our work.

The church's application to have the church hall de-registered has been successful! Once the land lease agreement is in place, the developer will make application with the HRM and we will keep you informed as things progress.

We thank you for your support of this project, and your continued support of the mission of the church. We know as this newsletter is printed, we will begin to receive almost 20 per cent of our year's givings in the month of December. Please continue your generosity, especially this month, as it makes such a difference in our church life and mission as we prepare to move into this next phase of our development.

Advent

It is good to have an end to journey towards, but it is the journey that matters, in the end. Ursula Le Guin

Scripture teaches that we are on a journey towards God. We may travel through many stages, places, people, events and experiences, but with every step God is walking with us guiding and leading us towards the destination that brings eternal life to all. Advent is the journey for us to finally come to the Bethlehem manager and often we want to shout "hurry up!" Many times we focus too much on the end of the journey and miss the joy of journeying itself, the joy of walking with God and of seeing God in everything taking place around us.

Each week in Advent we focus on a different aspect of the journey. Christian tradition would have us walk through the themes of HOPE, PEACE, JOY and LOVE. Enjoy the journey. Take time to consider what each of these themes mean to you as individuals and then how we as a community use them to prepare ourselves for the miraculous moment when the Messiah, the long-expected gift of God, is brought to birth in Bethlehem.

Finding God throughout our journey makes the journey meaningful and blessed. It is up to us to recognize moments of hope and peace, joy and love and, in so doing, become more fully conscious of God's presence. During this Advent let us take time to reflect on our own journey and see where we are on the journey. Remember Jesus promised his presence to the end of the age, to wherever the journey would take us. He also promised on that journey to be 'the way, the truth and the life' for us. He came to share with us the experience of God and His eternal love.

This Advent let's go to Bethlehem and see this thing that the Lord has made known to us. In the midst of shopping sprees let's ponder in our hearts the Gift of Gifts. Through the tinsel let's look for the gold of the Christmas Star. In the excitement and confusion, in the merry chaos, let's listen for the brush of angels' wings.

This Advent, let's go to Bethlehem and find our kneeling places.

The Advent wreath helps us focus on the meaning of the journey we take. The Advent wreath and candles are symbols that represent the anticipation of the arrival of the Christ child. Traditionally the wreath is made out of evergreen branches, which is a representation of life, even after all else has died.

• **Candle of Hope** The first purple candle is also known as the candle of

prophecy. It can represent the promise that foretold Christ's birth or the hope we have in Christ

- **Candle of Peace** The second purple candle is a reminder of the peace that God brings to us by forgiving our sins.
- **Candle of Joy** The third Advent candle is pink and represents the joy the shepherds felt at hearing the news of Christ's birth or the joy that God brings into our lives
- **Candle of Love** The third purple candle represents God's love, demonstrated by His son's death to save us
- **Christ Candle** This white candle sits at the center of the wreath and is not lit until Christmas Eve. This candle represents the birth of Jesus Christ.
